

This mission update is taken from a late February 2025 zoom event hosted by the Executive Director of Frontier Fellowship, Ethan Collins. The focus was the Islamic world in keeping with the next day's beginning of the observance of Ramadan during the month of March. Muslims in North Africa, Saudi Arabia, Central Asia, Indonesia and the horn of Africa represent 53.91% of the frontier population, while Hindus represent 43.34%. We heard from a former Muslim, Emmanuel, from Nigeria. Frontier Fellowship has a presence in the Sahel region and in the coastal area of this country where there are 364 unreached Muslim people groups, 132 with no gospel access. 225 languages are represented in the Sahel region. Emmanuel spoke of his background going to Saudi Arabia to study Islamic law and memorizing the Koran as the only culture he knew. He was praying when, "suddenly the world he knew disappeared." In a dream or a vision he saw a person coming from afar in white. He thought it was a demon and thought of running, asking Allah to protect him. Instead he heard, "Let my peace be with you. Don't be afraid. I am not a demon." He thought he heard the figure praying aloud. Emmanuel had this encounter six more times over a two year period. He began to study the Book of John recognizing Jesus as the One in his visions. He returned to Nigeria where "they almost killed him" and later settled for a time in South Africa. For Muslims who come to Christ Emmanuel estimated that about five of every 1000 are seeing visions. Engagement with a Christian accounts for more of these conversions. In Islam there is no such thing as a testimony. The "relationship with Allah" is impersonal. John 1 shows relationship with God is personal. Ramadan is a time of fasting, expectation and meditation about Allah in trembling and fear so that he might have mercy, and you might be saved from hellfire. In sharing your faith during Ramadan, Emmanuel's advice is to treat a Muslim friend or acquaintance as you would anyone else. They are more curious about your faith than you think, fascinated, in fact. They may ask, "How can you say God is a man?" If they don't ask, don't say anything. Pray for the Islamic world.




Last month, both of our music department interns had their senior recitals. Tyrel Smith's percussion recital program included the following solos – *Portraits in Rhythm #13* by Anthony J. Cirone (snare drum), *Suite for Cello No. 1 in G Major* by J. S. Bach (marimba), *Sonata for Timpani* by John Beck, *Paradiddle Johnnie* by Charles Wilcoxson (snare drum), and *Inspirations Diabolique* "Introduction" by Rickey Tagawa (multipercussion). Tyrel also performed a duet *Etude in Bossa* by Ney Rosauro (vibraphone with conga accompaniment), as well as a quartet on found percussion featuring trash cans and pots (*Flotsam and Jetsam* by John Herndon). Tyrel will be completing his student teaching requirements next year and then graduating in 2026.

Kayla Stork had her senior flute recital on April 22nd in Blount Chapel. She performed two unaccompanied flute solos – Danse de la Chevre (Dance of the Goat) by Arthur Honegger and The Pied Piper of Harlem by renowned Virginia composer Adolphus C. Hailstork. Kayla also played two accompanied solos with Dr. Anne Lewis on piano – Sonata II in E Flat Major (BWV 1031) by J. S. Bach and Regrets and Resolutions by Gary Shocker. Two unique flute duets rounded out the program, with Dr. Janet Phillips playing the second part – Five Pieces for Mechanical Clock (Mvt. III) by L.V. Beethoven and Danza del villano (La Princesa de la Media Luna) (Princess of the Half Moon) by Pablo Tribio Gil. Kayla will be graduating from Averett University this May with her bachelor's degree!

We are so proud of Tyrel and Kayla, and we celebrate their huge accomplishments with them. They have been exceptional students and colleagues, and we could not ask for more attentive or dedicated musicians.
