What Can I Give Him?

> In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone; Snow had fallen snow on snow, snow on snow, In the bleak midwinter, long ago.

Our God, heav'n cannot hold him, nor earth sustain; Heav'n and earth shall flee away, when he comes to reign, In the bleak midwinter a stable place sufficed; The Lord God incarnate, Jesus Christ.

What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a wise man, I would do my part; yet what I can I give him, give him my heart. What I can I give him, give him my heart.

About the Anthem:

Victorian poet Christina Rosetti wrote this poem in 1872, originally called "Christmas Carol," at the request of an American magazine, Scribner's Monthly. Rosetti was born to Italian parents in Lonon. Her father, Gabriele Rosetti, was Professor of Italian at Oxford; her mother, Frances Polidori, was a governess and a devout Anglican parishioner. One brother, Dante Gabriel Rosetti, was a famous painter. Christina began writing poems at age twelve, self-printing them on her grandfather's printing press. She was a prolific writer and was considered for the title of Poet Laureate near the end of her life. Historians suspect Rosetti was not chosen for the title because of her poor health due to Grave's disease and cancer.

Today's anthem text is often considered unusual because it is completely metrically irregular. The only metrical similarity between verses occurs in the final line of each stanza; each final line contains nine syllables. This presented a challenge for composers to write a tune suitable for all five of Rosetti's stanzas. Gustav Holst was certainly up to the challenge; you may remember Holst from his symphonic suites such as *The Planets*. He wrote this tune, CRANHAM, especially for Rosetti's text. The tune is named after Holst's birthplace, and it first appeared as "In the Bleak Midwinter" in The English Hymnal 1906. Mark Schweizer's arrangement of this anthem paints a picture of falling snow by using rhythmic syncopation and broken chords.

While we now understand that Jesus was born in a different climate and season, Rosetti's lyrics remind me that there is a coldness of heart in our fallen sin nature. We Christians must contend with the winter of the human soul, no matter the climate in which we reside. This text is also a call to stewardship during the Advent and Christmas seasons. The greatest gift we can give back to Christ is the gift of our very selves – our time, talents, and devotion.

LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT CANDLE "Joy" the Zagol family Leader: Last Sunday we lit the Candle of Peace. We light it, and the candle of Hope as we remember that Jesus, born in Bethlehem, will come again to fulfill all of God's promises and bring us everlasting peace and joy. [The Candles of Hope & Peace are lit.] Today we light the third candle of Advent, the Candle of Joy. When the angel Gabriel told Mary that a special child would be born to her she was filled with joy. She sang a song that began with the words: "My soul magnifies the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior." Just as the birth of Jesus gave great joy to his mother, so his presence in the world gave joy to those who had none before. He healed them and gave them hope and peace when they believed in him. From hope and peace grows joy. We light the Candle of Joy to remind us that when Jesus is born in us we have joy and that through him there will be everlasting joy on earth. We ask that as we wait for all your promises to come true and for Christ to come again, that you would remain present with us. Help us today and every day to worship you, to hear your word, and to do your will by sharing your joy with each other. We ask it in the name of the one who was born in Bethlehem. Amen.
